Password

Passwords occupy a normal and essential fact of life. In the olden days, if you can remember them or otherwise relate, they were a tool of people associated with speak easies and other forms of sin that people wanted to keep private. Passwords, in general, are meant to protect people from themselves or others. Today, however, passwords are common and useful—as long as you can remember them. Perhaps some of you have created passwords so cryptic that you almost need a password for your password. Or, at least, a little book for their addresses. (Password naturally.) Of course, you could keep them in an aptly named file, but then, what if ...?

While you won't find it mentioned in Scripture, passwords have ancient roots. Consider this:

"Lord, to whom shall we go? You have the words of eternal life" (John 6:68).

So asked Jesus' disciples, seeking clarification on one of His instructional sessions. They wanted to know how they could live together with Him in heavenly harmony. Jesus could have created a complicated admissions or process or added a few extra verses on password construction, but this is what He said:

If you confess with your mouth that Jesus is Lord and believe in your heart that God raised Him from the dead, you will be saved (Romans 10:9)

In fact, the Master Teacher could even have suggested that the mere mention of His name—together with believing in Him as their Savior, would be sufficient to open the gate to Him.

One thing about the password to eternal life that extremely differs from our passwords. Jesus actually wants us to share it! His password has the divine quality of inclusion rather than exclusion. And that's what you do as an educator. You, together with all believers, have both privilege and responsibility of sharing THE PASSWORD with your students and their families.

So then you are no longer strangers and aliens, but you are fellow citizens with the saints and members of the household of God, built on the foundation of the apostles and prophets, Christ Jesus himself being the cornerstone (Ephesians 2:19–20).

Amen? Amen!
